The Moira Way, our School Values alongside the Personal Development curriculum, help the pupils to understand the importance of laws, whether they be those in class, the school or the country. Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind school rules and national laws that protect us, look after us and govern us. We discuss with the children and make clear the consequences when rules in school and laws of the land are broken. We arrange visitors to speak with the children such as the Police, the Fire Brigade, and the NSPCC.
